Raw Striker Planning application

During a planning meeting held on 19/9/12 Hereford council voted against the proposed application. However the applicants are still able to appeal. Should this happen some residents in Mill Lane have shown interest in forming a residents association.

Each house hold that agrees can place the tree in their front/back garden but it must be overlooking Station Road. Hopefully this will deter any vandalism but create a great visual impact.

Harvest Festival time is here! It has been a really difficult year for farmers and growers. The quality of the crops has been fairly poor. They don't feel much like celebrating and we are expecting the costs of basic foods such as, bread and potatoes to rise considerably. We could be facing serious food shortages, and certainly those living on or below the poverty line will need help as time goes on.

St Mary's Church collects packaged food and tins for the Community Larder run by the Anglican Church in Herefordshire, to provide bags of food for families in serious and sudden hardship. We try to take a box full of tinned meat and potatoes, rice puddings, custard, tea and coffee and packets of sugar and rice, etc after every Family Communion on the second Sunday each month. This is distributed to local families facing hardship at this time. As costs rise there have been more and more families in this kind of need. If you would like to help, please drop in to the church, which is open during the day, and leave your gift at the back for us to take in after the family service. Thank you.

Our Community Harvest Festival will be on Sunday 14th October at the Community Hall at 6.30pm. Come along to sing the great harvest hymns and join us as we thank God for all that he provides. As we thank him, he blesses us and then fills us with joy. And although it has been a hard year for agriculture weather-wise, we have much to be thankful for. GARDENING by Doug Wellin

Some people think of Spring as the start of the gardening year, but really the start belongs to autumn, especially late autumn. What you do now is important to how your garden is going to look next Spring and Summer. Now is the time for planting deciduous trees and shrubs, but for goodness' sake do think about how big they are going to grow when they mature.



Very young trees that look attractive in their pots in the garden centre are like babies – they grow! It will only cause you problems if you plant in a small garden trees that really belong to woodland and in the open countryside. Remember that willows and ash have tremendous roots, so don't plant either; both need to be at least 80 feet from a building. Ash is a dreadful tree in a garden, so if a stray sapling appears get rid of it sooner rather than later. Weeping willows look beautiful, but in the distance; enjoy them in the Weir Garden down by the Wye. There are plenty of really good small trees to choose from, for example weeping cotoneasters on a standard stem (*cotoneaster hybridus pendulus* is fine) or if you've got room for something a bit bigger the ornamental weeping pear (*pyrus salicifolius*). There are books available from the public library on small ornamental trees.

Now is also the time for dividing most perennials. There are just a few exceptions such as the beautiful pulsatillas (pasque flower) which don't like root disturbance, but most perennials benefit from being split up every three years. Dig up the whole plant and break off some clumps from around the edge where usually there is good young growth. Replant those young bits and discard the old worn-out centre. Some plants you can pull apart with your hands, but most need a bit more persuasion and the kindest method is to prise the plant apart with two garden forks back to back. Otherwise resort to a sharp spade and a heavy boot.

For veg you can sow spring lettuce (winter hardy varieties) and plant out spring cabbages. Complete your planting of flowering bulbs, though you can plant tulips up to about the middle of November. Make a note of where you planted them, or stick a marker in, because if you are anything like me you'll forget where you planted them and you'll hook them out again when you are tidying round with the border fork. What to do about dahlias? They are one of the few flowers to have done well this year. Most books advocate digging up the tubers, drying them off and storing them in peat or sand for the winter out of frost's way.



If you've got some especially valuable specimens perhaps that's the thing to do, but I've had few losses from leaving them in. Most dahlia tubers are six inches or more down in the soil, and not only does it take hard weather to get down to them but most of them are tougher than their reputation would suggest. I've lost more by digging them up, because usually the conditions in which you store them are not ideal and the tubers rot or pick up disease. I reckon it's best to leave them where they are and let them take their chance.
